The Bishop will notify us of the date for Confirmation in December. We will send a notice home with the students as well as post the information in the bulletin and on the website. Confirmation practice is usually the night before the day of Sacrament.

REQUIRED ATTIRE FOR HOLY CONFIRMATION MASS

***Boys:** Dress slacks, dress shirt with collar, tie (jacket or sweater optional; long necktie is mandatory)

No jeans, athletic shoes or T-shirts

***Girls:** Dress, skirt with appropriate sweater or blouse, or pantsuit

Skirts must be at least knee length.

No low cut tops; shoulders must be covered

No tight fitting clothing

*Do not wear any ornamentation that denotes non-Christian attitudes and values.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Confirmation is the sacrament in which those who have been baptized receive the fullness of the Holy Spirit, Whom the Lord sent upon His apostles at Pentecost. It is the sacrament that celebrates God's special strengths and gifts of the Holy Spirit in those who have been baptized. Those confirmed are true witnesses of Christ and more strictly obliged to spread and defend the faith by word and deed.

In 1972, the church published the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). The RCIA stresses the connections between the three sacraments of Christian initiation – Baptism, Holy Eucharist and Confirmation.

In Baptism, a person becomes a Christian and receives grace and life from the Holy Spirit. In Confirmation, the baptismal vows are renewed and the sealing of the Spirit serves as a preparation for a mature Christian life.

In Eucharist, the great sign of Christian unity, the faithful are nourished and strengthened. They are transformed into a more loving and united community of believers. Through these sacramental rites the faithful are officially acknowledged as Christians. They are commissioned to carry out the mission of Christ and His Church.

Confirmation is a parish community celebration. It provides an opportunity for members of the parish family to renew their baptismal commitment. Confirmation time in the parish is a time when the community celebrates the gifts of the Holy Spirit among them.

RITE OF CONFIRMATION

The Sacrament of Confirmation:

- Celebrated during Mass
- Begins after the Liturgy of the Word
- Presided over by the bishop or a designated auxiliary or pastor.

- There are four parts to the rite:
- Renewal of baptismal vows
- Laying on of hands

- Anointing with oil
- Sign of peace

THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF PARENTS

Parents are:

- Primary educators of their children
- Responsible for initiating their children into the sacramental life
- Models for their child by being committed Christians
- Leaders in their family faith life
- Nurturers of their children's faith life
- Encouragers their child to reflect on and thoughtfully consider the decision to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation
- Asked to assist their child with the immediate preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation through prayer, study, and Christian service
- The important part of the Sacrament of Confirmation by taking an active role in the celebration of Confirmation
- Able to stress the initiation aspect of the Sacrament by encouraging their children to continue learning more about their faith
- Guides to their child in understanding that the Confirmation service project is the beginning of a life committed to Christian service.

CANDIDATES PREPARING FOR CONFIRMATION

Candidates must:

- Freely choose to be confirmed and make their desire known
- Be in the state of grace
- Have adequate knowledge of the Catholic faith and have participated in required learning sessions
- Be practicing their faith
- Attend Mass and receive the Sacraments of Eucharist and Reconciliation regularly
- Be responsible for completing all required home study and service projects

- Acquire an awareness of the Initiation of the Sacrament of Confirmation and commit to continuing faithful practice and study of their religion
- Be willing to participate in the Confirmation classes and retreat.

CANDIDATE REVIEW GUIDE

The following topics should already be mastered by anyone entering a Confirmation preparation program. Parents and sponsors should assist candidates in reviewing this material.

The Ten Commandments

1. I am the Lord, your God; you shall not have other gods besides me.
2. You shall not take the name of the Lord, your God, in vain.
3. Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day.
4. Honor your father and mother.
5. You shall not kill
6. You shall not commit adultery.
7. You shall not steal.
8. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
9. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife.
10. You shall not covet anything that belongs to your neighbor.

Duties of a Catholic Christian:

- To keep holy the day of the Lord's resurrection (Sunday). To worship God by participating in Mass for every Sunday and holy day of obligation. To avoid those activities (like needless work) that would hinder worship, joy, or relaxation.
- To lead a sacramental life. To receive Holy Communion frequently and the Sacrament of Reconciliation regularly.
- To study Catholic teachings in preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation, to be confirmed, and then to continue to study and advance the cause of Christ.
- To observe the marriage laws of the Church. To give religious training, by word and example, to one's children. To use parish schools and catechetical programs.
- To strengthen and support the Church – one's own parish community and parish priests, the worldwide Church, and the Pope.

- To do penance, including abstaining from meat and fasting from food on the appointed days.
- To join in the missionary spirit and apostolate of the Church.



But one and the same Spirit produces all of these, distributing them individually to each person as he wishes. (Cor 12: 11)

Holy Days of Obligation in the United States

1. Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God: January 1 – We honor Mary, the Mother of God.
2. Ascension: Fortieth day after Easter – Jesus ascended into heaven.
3. Assumption: August 15 – Mary was taken into heaven, body and soul.
4. All Saint’s Day: November 1 – We honor all the saints in heaven.
5. Immaculate Conception: December 8 – Mary was free from sin from the first moment of her life.
6. Christmas: December 25 – We celebrate the birth of Jesus.
